LKS2 – Redcar Rocks

Redcar is a vibrant, coastal market town within the Redcar and Cleveland authority. In 1300's it originated as a fishing town. It is home to the world's oldest surviving lifeboat – 'The Zetland'. It has always been known for its Industry and Steel work, however there are some significant people who have lived and worked in the area and have contributed to its success. In 2013 Redcar launched the vertical pier. There are approximately 40,000 in the population of Redcar. It is thought the name Redcar comes from the red coloured rocks named 'carrs'.

Wilf Mannion

Born in 1918 in South Bank Middlesbrough, Wilfred James Mannion was an English professional footballer who played as an inside forward, making over 350 senior appearances for Middlesbrough. He also played international football for England. With his blonde hair, he was nicknamed "The Golden Boy". There is a statue dedicated to Mannion outside the Riverside Stadium.

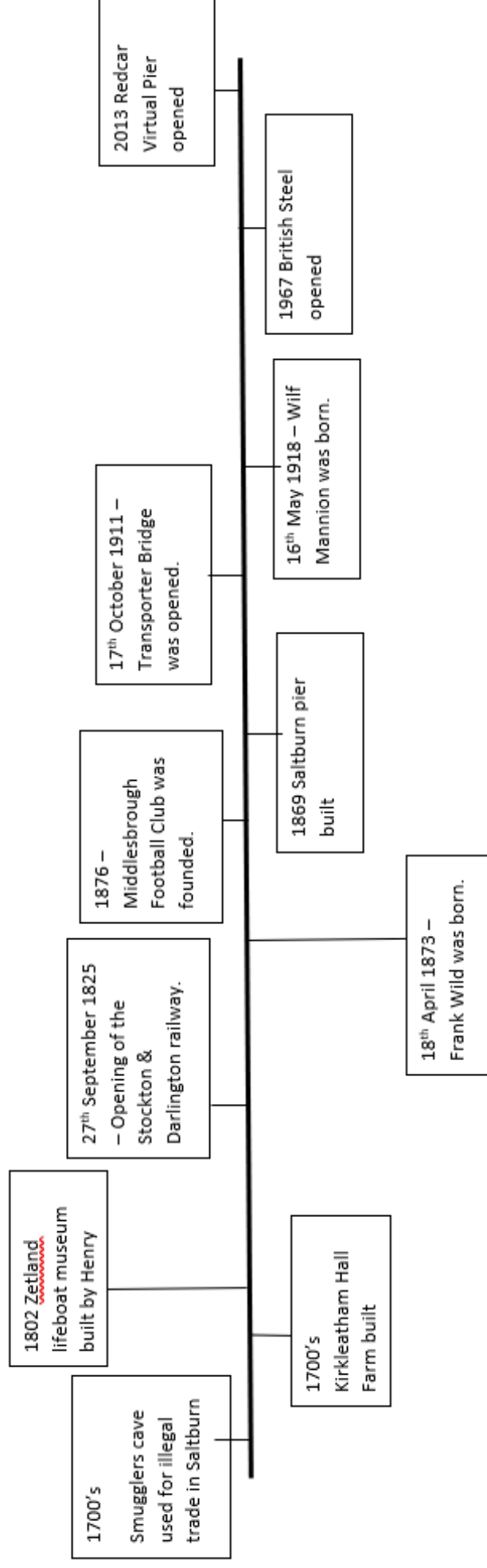
Frank Wild

Born in Skelton (Redcar) in 1873, Frank Wild was an English sailor and explorer. Born John Robert Francis Wild he was the second of 13 children. Best known as Ernest Shackleton's second in command as they attempted to cross Antarctica aboard the Endurance, he is a celebrated explorer and polar hero.

Saltburn-by-the-sea

5 miles south of Redcar sits Saltburn with a population of around 6000 people. It is well known for its cliff-side tram, long stretching pier and infamous smuggler's cave which hid illegal trade in the 1700's.

Frank Wild:

John Robert Francis Wild was born on 18th April 1873 in Skelton in Cleveland. Frank was the one of 13 children. His father was a schoolteacher and his mother a seamstress. When he was 16 he joined the Navy. He was an English sailor and explorer and participated in 5 expeditions to Antarctica during the Heroic Age of Antarctic Exploration. He is one of only two men to receive the Polar Medal with four bars for this expedition. In 1916, he was left in charge of 21 men on desolate Elephant Island. For more than 4 months they waited on the island, surviving on a diet of seal, penguin and seaweed. Wild was awarded a CBE in 1920. On 29th September 2016, a statue of wild was unveiled in his hometown.



Wilf Mannion:

Wilfred James Mannion was born in South Bank, Middlesbrough on 16th May 1918. He was the son of Irish immigrants Tommy and Mary Mannion, and was one ten children. Wilf was a professional footballer who played over 350 appearances for Middlesbrough. His nickname was 'The Golden Boy' because of his blonde hair. He first joined Boro in 1936. During his time there he scored 110 goals. Wilf also had an international career, playing for England 26 times between 1946 – 51. He remains the only Middlesbrough player to score for England in the World Cup. Wilf died on 14th April 2000 at the age of 81. To celebrate his success at the club, a statue of him was erected outside of the Riverside Stadium, Boro's home ground.
